Sentence Structures

1) Simple/ Compound/ Complex sentence structures.

Sentence Structure:	Definition:
Simple	A basic sentence consisting of only one independent clause. E.g. The cat sat on the mat.
Compound	Two simple sentences (independent clauses) linked by the use of a connective. E.g. The cat sat on the mat and it purred happily.
Complex	A sentence containing a full (independent) clause and at least one subordinate (dependent) clause. E.g. The cat, who loved attention, sat on the mat and purred happily.
