## **Changing Simple Tenses to Perfect Tense**

Instructions: Perfect tenses describe actions that are completed (or "perfected") in relation to another time. They are formed using the helping verbs have, has, or had + the past participle of the main verb.

- Present Perfect: (has/have + past participle) For actions that happened at an unspecified time in the past or that started in the past and continue to the present.
- Past Perfect: (had + past participle) For an action that was completed before another action in the past.
- Future Perfect: (will have + past participle) For an action that will be completed before a specific time in the future.

Change the underlined verb from a simple tense to the corresponding perfect tense. The first one is done for you.

1.	Simple: She finished her work. (Simple Past)
	Perfect: She has finished her work. (Present Perfect - implies the action is relevant now)
2.	Simple: They eat lunch. (Simple Present)
	Perfect: They lunch. (Present Perfect)
3.	Simple: I will complete the course by May. (Simple Future)
	Perfect: I the course by May. (Future Perfect)
4.	Simple: He left when we arrived. (Simple Past)
	Perfect: He before we arrived. (Past Perfect - shows which action
	happened first)
